Last spring the Social Action Committee initiated our annual Offering of Letters of Bread for the World. We asked for letters to our representatives supporting a new farm bill that is fairer to struggling US farm families and hungry and poor



people around the world. On June 18, 2008, the US farm bill was enacted into law despite vetoes by President Bush. It expires fiscal year 2012. The final law includes a significant increaseapproximately \$10.3 billion over 10 years-in nutrition assistance. The bill maintains the status quo on commodity payments for generally wealthy farmers, but BFW's efforts have changed the debate about the farm bill and made nutrition the most critical component of the bill. It also highlighted the unfairness of our commodity pieces. Your efforts made a difference. Thank you. The Social Action Committee
