A S T I've been hearing a lot more from people about the end of times. We are hearing through the media about ever increasing wars and its devastation touching most countries in the world. We are hearing and seeing the devastations from earthquakes and volcanoes and the devastating oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico. It looks like the earth is bleeding. So many people are looking at the prophesies from the Book of Revelation as their guide.

Our summer worship services will touch on the Book of Revelation. I am doing so, partly because of its interests, partly because it is misunderstood, partly because this book of hope is seen as a book of terror. Revelation is widely popular for the wrong reasons. It is viewed as a guide to how the world will end, assuming that the author was given by Christ detailed knowledge of the future that he communicated in coded symbols. For example, different preachers and teachers have in the past and present identified the Beast from the Earth whose number is 666 as Hitler, Stalin, the Pope, and Saddam Hussein, and have related events in Revelation to the Communist Revolution, the atom bomb, the creation of the State of Israel, the Gulf Wars and so on. Since the 19th century people have seen many interpreters of prophesy who used calculations from Revelation to predict the exact date of the end of the world (Up to the moment all have been wrong).

On the other hand, many believing Christians do not think that the author knew the future in any sense beyond an absolute conviction that God would triumph by saving those who remain loyal and by defeating the forces of evil. I am one of those who take this latter stance.

I suggest that if possible, read the whole book through without getting bogged down with particular details from particular passages. That ay help avoid the tendency to pick out a few symbolic references and to speculate about them. It will be helpful to remember that this was written to the seven churches and its details and historical context pertain to the first century not the 21st century.

In today's world that accepts only what it can see, hear, and feel, Revelation is a scriptural gateway to what the eye has not seen and the ear has not heard, because its visions are filled with theological symbols, not with photographic reproductions of an exact knowledge of that other world. Revelations provides colorful, descriptive, and out of this world images to attest that at every moment of human history, even the most desperate moment that causes people to lose hope, God is present. The lamb standing as though slain is the ultimate guarantee of God's victorious care and deliverance, especially for the downtrodden and oppressed. If we keep this overall attitude in mind as we read Revelation, we will keep a perspective that will help us recognize God speaking and working in our lives today.
