T O "Give, and it will be given to you: good measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over will be put into your lap. For with the measure that you use, it will be measured back to you," Luke 6:38.

Giving is related to eternal life, and eternal life means everlasting joy. The adventure of giving leads to exuberant joy. In the winter of 1935, a group of ministers met to study the spiritual needs and possibilities of the church during the dark days of the Great Depression. In the Lord's Supper they saw a great opportunity to unite Christians in dedication to Christ.

In 1937, the date of World-Wide Communion Sunday was changed to the first Sunday in October, where it has remained. The word "wide" has since been dropped from the name, giving us the present observance of World Communion Sunday.

The day remains as it began: "A great opportunity to unite the membership in dedication to the Lord Jesus Christ." People from the four corners of the world gather together to answer Christ's invitation, "This do in remembrance of me."

New Art Exhibit in Hilty Room



The official walk distance is 3 miles, but walkers are encouraged to go the distance they are most comfortable. It is a wonderful opportunity to join with other Dayton area churches in a meaningful mission effort. This is also the Sunday you are invited to bring your water (bank) bottles to the second worship service for a blessing.

The proceeds of the walk benefit Church World Service. CWS was founded in 1946 and is a cooperative ministry of 36 denominations and communions. It works with partners to eradicate hunger and poverty and promote peace and justice around the world. You are invited to view the world map posted outside the church office door for the many outreach programs it sponsors around the globe. More information can be found at www.churchworldservice.org.

CWS is providing food for some 91,200 people displaced by flooding in Pakistan. More than 100,000 received emergency and preventative care through CWS mobile health units and CWS-managed health facilities. They are also providing shelter kits and planning construction trades training, cash-for-work projects and grants to help the recovery effort.

Dear GOPCC Members,

This past summer, Rev. King gave a sermon that referred to blessing same sex unions. Around the same time, the youth group attended a UCC event that promoted LGBT workshops and other materials. These events created much discussion among our board members over the last three months and finally we came to a motion and a vote. The following is the motion:

Rev. Greg King made a motion and it was seconded that would reaffirm an already existing agreement between GOPCC and Rev. King that "same sex" blessings and marriages will not be performed at GOPCC and by their minister; and that all GOPCC church supported education, discussions, and questions concerning homosexuality in our children and youth activities be restricted and referred back to their parents. The motion was unanimously approved.

Due to the events that transpired, the board members also passed the following motion:

The Mission & Outreached committee recommended that Our Church's Wider Mission (OWCM) of the United Church of Christ be taken out the line item of their budget. The Finance and Stewardship committee after much discussion agreed to that proposal from Mission & Outreach. Upon creating a 2011 budget modifying it from 2010, Finance and Stewardship presented the 2011 budget to the Official Board. After a motion and a second to present Finance and Stewardship's 2011 budget to the November Annual Meeting the motion was approved. After more discussion and a consensus among the Board members, Rev. King made a motion to include the OCWM as an annual Special Offering at a time not connected with our Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter Special Offerings.
