Light from Bethlehem's Star

Sue and I traveled to Berryville, Va. to spend Thanksgiving with Katie and Carl. Thanksgiving night we were standing in the driveway and I looked up at the sky. It was brilliant with stars and no clouds to be seen for miles. And I got to thinking about the star of Bethlehem and how it shone over the Christ child that night long ago.

As I was searching for resources for this week's message I happened upon the following information about the Bethlehem Star. Wherever the spirit of God has found expression in a life, you can believe that the star of Bethlehem paused over a cradle.

November 13, 354, the star stood over a baby lying in a cradle in Tagaste, North Africa. He was named Aurelius Augustinus, and he was to become St Augustine. He was one who was to speak of the things of God and later was to point to the coming city of God even as the vandals battered down the gates of his home city of Hippo in North Africa.

In 1091 that star shone over a cradle in Fonatines in Burgundy. The baby therein was named Bernard. Later the word of God sounded through the voice of Bernard of Clairvaux as he sought to carry the light of the gospel to the darkening continent of Europe. Here was the word made flesh in the form of a man of brilliant mind and steady faith.

A century later the star hovered over the little village of Assissi in the Umbrian hills of Italy.
Bernadone and Pica were the wealthy parents of the baby Francis. The name of Francis of Assisi became associated with purity of motive and deed and with absolute love of God and mankind.

Follow the star to Eisleben, Germany, where November 10. 1483, the home of Hans and Margaret Luther was gladdened with the arrival of a baby who they named Martin because the next day was St, Martin's Day. Here was a life that was to be lived for the word and a voice that

& was to proclaim that the just shall live by faith and that every man is his own priest before God in that inner shrine where he comes face to face with the heavenly father. From his pen came the Reformation hymn, "A Mighty Fortress is our God." At Christmas we sing his "Cradle Hymn."

June 17th, 1703 it paused over the home of Samuel and Susannah Wesley. Their 15th child was named John, who became the life and voice that saved England from moral disaster. His was the witness that established the Methodist church.

S The star paused again on March 19th, 1813 when David Livingstone was born Blantyre in the Scottish Highlands. The star and faith he found in its light lead him into darkest Africa where

 P he gave his life to bring the light of the gospel of God who has come to earth in Jesus Christ. That star even sought out a little cabin in Hodgenville, KY on February 12, 1809 where Abraham Lincoln entered the world where he was to become God's man in bringing freedom to a slave people.

September 6, 1860 Jane Adams was born and in 1889 she opened Hull House in Chicago where she personally led the fight against slums, sweatshops, and disease.

Once again that star paused in 1875 over Gunsbach in Alsace, and Albert Schweitzer was born. He was the first missionary to ever receive the Nobel Peace prize for his work in Africa where he dispensed health and faith, love and peace, in Jesus name.

Through many years scores of homes have been gladdened with the arrival of babies. Can we dare to believe that these children as they grow in wisdom and stature will also grow in favor with God and man because there is something of God in each of these precious lives? How can you tell but that outside one of these nurseries today the star shines to signify the coming of one whose maturity will see him or her as the leader who brings permanent peace to our struggling world? And who will refuse to hope when his hope is in God?

Christ, THE Savior

The church today faces a crisis of Christology. Certain teachers cite "ecumenical embarrassment," "western triumphalism," lack of global awareness," "Christian arrogance" and "scientific improbablility" as grounds for speculating that Christ is only one spiritual guide among others. However, Scripture pictures him sitting at "the right hand of God; with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him' (I Peter 3:22)

... the astounding wonder of the Christian Gospel is that for our sakes God the Father freely gave his sinless Son to the world so that through his redeeming work we might become "the righteousness of God." - shared from 'The Asbury Herald'

A broadcaster writes of Christmas

The late Harry Reasoner of CBS's 'Sixty Minutes' penned some thoughtful words about the meaning of Christmas, a smattering of which are as follows:

"Almost nobody has seen God, and almost nobody has any real idea of what he's like and the truth is that...the idea of seeing God suddenly and standing in the very bright light is not necessarily a completely comfortable and appealing idea."

"But everyone has seen babies, and most people like them. If God wanted to be loved as well as feared, he moved correctly here. If he wanted to know his people as well as rule them, he moved correctly here, for a baby growing up learns all about people. If God wanted to be intimately a part of [humanity], he moved correctly, for the experience of birth and familyhood is our most intimate and precious experience."

"So it comes beyond logic. It is either all falsehood, or it is the truest thing in the world. It is a story of the great innocence of God the baby, God in the power of man; and it is such a dramatic shot toward the heart that if it is not true, for Christians nothing is true.

"So, if a Christian is touched only once a year, the touching is still worth it. And maybe on some given Christmas, some final quiet morning, the touch will take."
