The Wonder of Words

The Lenten season began February 13th, with the celebration of Ash Wednesday. As we begin to move through this season of preparing ourselves for Easter seeking reconciliation in our relationship with God through penitence and forgiveness, I found an article in the March/April 1988 Pulpit Digest by Rev. Edward Chinn reference Lent I thought I would share with all of you.

Lent offers us a choice between two roads: the road of silver slippers or the road of iron shoes. First, there is the religion of silver slippers. In 1678 an English preacher named John Bunyan wrote a religious allegory called *The Pilgrim Progress*. The hero of the story was a man named Christian who set out from the City of Destruction to go to the Celestial City, which stood for heaven. On his journey Christian met a man named By-ends. By-ends told Christian about the people who lived in his hometown. Speaking of his fellow townspeople, By-ends said: "Tis true, we somewhat differ in religion from those of the stricter sort, yet but in two small points: First, we never strive against wind and tide. Secondly, we are always most zealous when Religion goes in his silver slippers; we love much to walk with him in the street, if the sun shines, and the people applaud him."

As Fredrick Eliot once said, religion in silver slippers is for those bright moments when faith shines brightly, when the way before our feet is pleasant, and we celebrate days of happy festivals.

Secondly, there is the religion of iron shoes. One day a pig and a chicken walked past a church. On the church's bulletin board was the plea, "Everybody's help is needed!" The chicken commented, "We could help by giving a 'Ham 'n' Egg' Breakfast." The pig replied, "Sure, that's easy for you to say. From you the eggs will only be a donation, but for me to provide the ham will call for total commitment." Likewise, Lent calls on us to give total commitment to the road of discipline. Through Moses God offers us a religion of iron shoes for the rough road ahead. Roy Angell has reminded us that before Moses ascended the mountain to die, he gave a series of blessings to the various tribes of Israel. To Asher, Moses said (in the inspiring mistranslation of the King James Version): "Thy shoes shall be iron and brass" (Deut. 33:25). To lace those iron shoes on our feet, Moses gave three beautiful promises: "As thy days, so shall thy strength be" (v. 27): "The eternal God is thy refuge" (v. 27): "Underneath are the everlasting arms" (v. 27.).

When one commits themselves totally to following Christ, it may take a pair of iron shoes for the walk was never promised to be easy. But at the end of the road, one day your iron shoes will no longer be needed and you will wear the comfortable silver slippers for an eternity.

The children first lined the boxes up and created the world's largest domino chain of boxes. The chain was triggered by Green Oak's

Valerie Baker and Ascension's Brent Devitt. The children then created a fireman like line and passed all the boxes from the Ascension school to the food pantry next door. The children spoke about how being hungry can make a child angry or distracted and keep them from being the best students they can be. We learned that we can partner to help Montgomery county children and families eat healthy breakfasts.

Blanket Sunday, February 24

We will again be accepting donations for Church World Service's Tools of Hope and Blanket Program on Sunday, February 24. Church World Service is the relief, development, and refugee assistance ministry of 36 Protestant, Orthodox, and Anglican denominations and communions. They work in partnership with indigenous organizations in more than 80 countries worldwide, supporting the sustainable self-help development of poor people, meeting emergency needs and addressing the root causes of poverty and powerlessness. Our past support has made recent efforts possible. Some of those items are:

In January of this year floods (following an extended drought) have ravaged Kenya. Subsequent landslides have compounded the devastation, tragically burying people (including children) alive. Rescue efforts continue as the waters have not yet receded and hundreds of people have been displaced. Church World Service has responded with 600 blankets and 300 mattresses for the short term. Further response may be required.

The recent cross-border violence in Gaza & Israel has worsened the humanitarian situation in Gaza. CWS and its partners are emphasizing support for people who sustained physical or psychological trauma as well as people who urgently need emergency assistance.

Ordinary things – things that we often take for granted like blankets, clean water, education, tents, garden tools, seeds – can make a world of difference for people devastated by tragedy. Be part of this effort to make a difference for people around the world. Social Action
