#### THE DIGNITY OF LABOR

George Sweeting wrote an interesting article on the Dignity of Labor that I thought I would share with you.

On the first Monday in September, America celebrates Labor Day. It is a day of parades, picnics, and political speeches, a time when we recognize the millions of Americans who make up this nation's work force.

Labor Day means traditions to some, a holiday to others. But just what is it we are celebrating? And why does labor deserve such recognition?

Why do we labor? In Genesis 3:19 God tells Adam that because of his sin in the Garden of Eden, he will earn his bread by the sweat of his brow. Gone were the ideal conditions of Eden. Instead of "dressing" the garden, as he did originally, Adam and his descendants would engage in toil. The ground would bring forth thorns and thistles, and man would be required to labor.

God told Adam that his life would now be spent in labor. He would toil until the day he returned to the dust from which he had come. It is interesting, yet ironic, to realize that the thing we now honor – labor – is a direct result of the judgment of God passed upon man in the Garden of Eden. It is the result of sin!

Throughout America's history, we have recognized the importance of labor. From its inception, this nation has been dedicated to the principle of work.

The labor of millions of men and women has brought unequaled prosperity to our land. Only as we recognize and maintain the value of true, hard work can we remain a strong and determined people.

Someone has said that there are three kinds of people: those who make things happen, those who watch things happen, and those who have no idea what has happened. Today we need fewer watchers and more doers.

King Solomon said, "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might (Eccl 9:10). God's principle for [humanity] is work, God intends for us to work.

On Labor Day we recognize the dignity of work and the rights of the worker. Jesus believed in the dignity of labor. He was concerned about the worker and his work. In Luke 10:7 He says, "The laborer is worthy of his wages."

Today millions of people around the world belong to labor unions. But few realize that trade unions were originally an outgrowth of the spiritual revivals of John and Charles Wesley.

In the early 1700's, working conditions in Britain had become inhumane. People worked 16 hours a day, six days a week. Children as young as 10 worked long hours in mines and factories; many died from accidents or simply from exhaustion. The working person – man, woman, or child – was little more than a slave to be exploited. The lives of many workers were characterized by drunkenness, immorality, and hopelessness.

At the same time, the Wesley's were traveling and preaching to crowds throughout England. Their influence prompted a great return to God and the beginning of social liberty in that country. Men such as Bishop William Wilberforce and Lord Shaftesbury began to force legislation that brought relief to the working classes. Whenever and wherever the gospel is proclaimed, it produces earthly as well as heavenly changes.

James warns wealthy employers of God's judgment upon their evil deeds. Those who spend their lives enjoying themselves and satisfying their whims at the expense of their employees are warned about a day of reckoning.

In Exodus, Israel is being exploited by the Egyptians. The Lord says, "I have surely seen the oppression of my people who are in Egypt, and have heard their cry because of their taskmasters, for I know their sorrows" (Ex. 3:7). God sees, hears, and knows when a worker is treated unfairly.

God also sees the laborer. The worker who loafs on the job is guilty of stealing. God sees the employee who pads his expense account or does outside business on company time. Failure to put in a good day's work is dishonest, and God knows.

But no matter what your position this Labor Day, Christ extends an invitation to you. No matter how others have treated you. He will treat you fairly. To employer and employee alike, Jesus says, "Come ... and I will give you rest "(Matt. 11:28). Hope you and your family had a great Labor Day Weekend.

### Search Committee Update:

Even though the search committee has been extremely busy pursuing a qualified candidate to serve as our next pastor, we also recognize that we need to do a better job in keeping the congregation informed of our progress. To that end, we've compiled a brief summary of our activities to let you know what we've accomplished and where we stand at this time. Closely following the UCC pastoral search guidelines.

For the past 15 months your pastoral search committee, which consist of 14 very dedicated members has accomplished the following:

- 1. We surveyed the congregation to ensure all views were fully considered.
- 2. We collected church relevant historical information as well as detailed demographics representative of the congregation and local community.
- 3. Over numerous weeks we distilled this information into a detailed church profile which embodies who we are and what we seek in a new pastor. (Copy in church office.)
- 4. The Official Board approved the church profile and it was posted with UCC.
- 5.To date we have received, reviewed, voted on, and discussed over 75 profiles from pastors across the country.
- 6.As a committee we have met at least 40 times over the past 15 months with each meeting lasting an average of 2 hours.
- 7. The committee has created a series of first and second interview questions to assist us in selecting candidates that satisfy our church profile.
- 8.Based on your recommendations to us, through the surveys, we have identified 20 candidates who we felt met the criteria of the congregation. Of those, we continue to actively pursue a handful of highly qualified candidates. Additionally, we continue to receive new candidate profiles from the UCC.

In summary, the pastoral search committee has dedicated a substantial amount of time, energy, and effort in an attempt to find a new pastor who fully meets the criteria the congregation established. Individually we have invested over 200 hours in the process and we're fully committed to see this through to the end. Your Official Board is fully supportive of our efforts and your continued thoughts and prayers are invaluable to our future success.
