




Remember Pastor Gabe's Q & A sessions will be held on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month following 10:45 AM worship.

Dear Friends,

It look like fall is right around the corner which means Back to School for the kids. We have certainly had a busy summer here at Homefull. I usually love the summers at Homefull because it takes me back to what brought me here in the first place, the kids.

My first summer here was over 20 years ago, I was working with children to provide them a summer camp program that would literally and figuratively take them away from homelessness every day. Those days were spent at the zoo, water parks, museums, horseback riding, swimming, eating ice cream, singing camp songs and making arts and crafts projects. I was introduced to homelessness through the children. These kids weren't what I pictured as homeless. They were kids who laughed, enjoyed life and were full of hopes and dreams. I brought my own children to work with me in those days. Roddy my oldest son would play alongside homeless children every day. He asked me 'where are the toys and where do my friends sleep?" He asked regularly to have them all over for sleepovers and made friends with the kids and over the years their paths have crossed from time to time, usually around sports. I am reminded that my children have been given opportunities and lives that are very different from their summer friends at Homefull all these years ago.

Sadly the average age of a homeless person in this country is 9 years old. That means a Fourth Grader!

I wish I could tell you it is 20 years later and we have ended homelessness, but I can't. Homelessness still exists and there are more families and children homeless today that ever before. The Good News is Homefull has more programs today for families and works tirelessly to end homelessness.

We needed you 20 years ago and we need you today!
